




Reunification A Collaborative Effort



1. **Notification:** Parents are notified of the incident and the reunification site location.
2. **Arrival:** Parents arrive at the site and are greeted by a Greeter who explains the process and provides forms.
3. **Check-in:** Parents fill out a Reunification Card and give it to a Checker, who verifies their ID and processes the card. The Checker returns the bottom part of the card to the parent.
4. **Assembly:** Students are kept in a separate Student Assembly Area out of sight from the media and parents, where they are managed by staff.
5. **Reunification:** The Reunifier takes the bottom of the card to the assembly area, retrieves the student, and escorts them to the parent.
6. **Exit:** The student and parent leave the controlled area together after the student confirms they are okay to go.

Civic Center Complex - (1000 John Fitch Highway)

- If students and staff from a school site need to be relocated, they will be transported to the Wallace Civic Center/Landry Arena.
- FPD, FFD, FSUPD, FSU volunteers, and FPS staff will help to coordinate a controlled reunification with parents/families/guardians.





Bullying and Student Behavior

This was the most frequently mentioned concern, with many comments about bullying, fights, aggression, and the need for consistent enforcement of rules and consequences.

Safety and Security


Strong focus on improving school security measures like locked doors, visitor verification, cameras, hall monitoring, and having resource officers.

Mental Health and Support Services

Repeated calls for better mental health resources, counseling, social-emotional learning, and support for special needs students.

Student Behavior & Accountability

Staff are concerned about **increasing disruptive and aggressive student behavior** and feel there is a **lack of consistent consequences and enforcement of rules** (e.g., phones, fighting, disrespect).

School Safety & Security

Concerns include **building safety issues**, such as door locks, visitor access, camera coverage, and the need for **more security presence and clearer safety procedures**.

Staffing & Support

Staff report a need for **more personnel, training, and behavioral supports** to safely manage student needs and maintain a positive learning environment.

Physical Security & Monitoring



516 operating security cameras throughout and around the **8** school buildings.



154 door access/badge entries (**220** exterior door sets).



38 vape detection units in middle & high school student bathrooms.



10 security monitors in middle & high schools ensuring secure buildings and quick response.

3 full-time Fitchburg Police Dept. School Resource Officers:

- FHS and Goodrich
- Memorial, Reingold, McKay
- Longsjø, Crocker, South Street



51 school counselors, clinical interventionists, adjustment counselors for social emotional needs.



Each school has a **Home Liaison** for family welcome, support, and safety function.


Security Measures

What is the role of a School Resource Officer?


Staff: Panel Questions
