#### **Finance Committee**

A meeting of the Finance Committee was called to order by Councilor DiNatale on Wednesday, June 14, 2023 at 6:06 PM in the Legislative Building, 700 Main Street, Fitchburg, MA.

Committee Members present: Councilors Paul Beauchemin, Marcus DiNatale, Samantha Squailia, and Anthony Zarrella.

Committee Members absent: Councilor Andrew Van Hazinga.

The chairman read an announcement regarding the recording of public meetings, noting that FATV was recording and broadcasting the meeting. No other person stated that they were recording the meeting.

The chairman opened the meeting for public comment. No one spoke.

171-23

ORDER: that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of NINETEEN THOUSAND, SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY-EIGHT AND 00/100 DOLLARS (\$19,758.00) same to be charged against AVAILABLE FUNDS and credited to EMPLOYEE BENEFITS, CHAPTER 41 POLICE.

Discussion: The chairman read a letter from City Treasurer Anne Cervantes dated May 31, 2023. Action: On a motion made by Councilor Zarrella second by Councilor Beauchemin, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #171-23.

172-23

ORDER: that there be and hereby is transferred from within the sum of TWENTY-SIX THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED 00/100 DOLLARS (\$26,200.00) same to be transferred from ELECTION & REGISTRATION, PERSONAL SERVICES, ELECTION WORKERS and credited to the following accounts:

CITY COUNCIL EXPENSES \$11,200.00 CITY CLERK EXPENSES \$ 2,000.00 ELECTION & REGISTRATION EXPENSES \$13,000.00

Discussion: The chairman read a letter from City Clerk Joanna Bilotta-Simeone dated May 25, 2023. Councilors asked if the order was for City Hall expenses as stated in the letter or for City Council expenses as stated on the order. The presumption was that it is for City Council expenses, because the request was coming from the City Clerk and not the Facilities Director. Action: On a motion made by Councilor Beauchemin second by Councilor Squailia, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #172-23.

ORDER: that the City of Fitchburg hereby approves the expenditure of funds from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts earmark in the approximate amount of \$25,000.00 (TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND AND 00/100 DOLLARS) for the purpose of said earmark, which is to support the renovation and expansion of the Fitchburg Police Department dispatch center.

Discussion: Police Chief Ernest Martineau was present. He thanked Rep. Michael Kushmerek for getting this earmark. The timing is helpful, because they are working on design alternatives for police station renovation.

Councilors asked about earlier appropriations for this project. Chief Martineau replied that there was an initial appropriation of \$50,000 for design work and \$180,000 for the OPM. They are currently reexamining the original design for the station. The alternative design they are considering uses a lot of the design work from the original plan. Councilors expressed concern about spending money on the dispatch center and then having the city regionalize. The chief answered that while the city has never stopped looking at regionalization of dispatch, the project at the police station is to expand the workable space in the building and to make the building more accessible for people with disabilities.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Beauchemin second by Councilor Squailia, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #173-23.

ORDER: that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-FOUR THOUSAND, THREE HUNDRED NINETY-NINE AND 11/100 DOLLARS (\$124,399.11) from RESERVE FOR APPROPRIATION, PEG ACCESS and credited to INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY, FRANCHISE FEE for the purpose of paying FATV for franchise fees received during the second quarter of 2023.

Discussion: The chairman explained that this order is for the quarterly payment the city makes to FATV for quarterly franchise fees collected from Comcast and Verizon.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Beauchemin second by Councilor Zarrella, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #174-23.

ORDER: that there be and hereby is transferred from within the sum of ONE HUNDRED THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND AND 00/100 DOLLARS (\$135,000.00) same to be transferred from PARKS PERSONAL SERVICES, DEPARTMENT HEAD (\$85,000.00) and LABOR (\$50,000.00) and credited to PARKS CAPITAL, DEPARTMENTAL EQUIPMENT (\$120,000.00) and PARKS EXPENSES, GAS & OIL (\$15,000.00).

Discussion: Public Works Commissioner Nick Erickson was present. The chairman read a letter from Mr. Erickson dated May 31, 2023. In response to Councilors, he stated that this truck and the two on the next order will have plows. They are working on acquiring a fourth truck from an earlier appropriation. He then handed out an updated Auto Fleet Schedule for the department. Councilors asked that city employees treat the new equipment well. Mr. Erickson said he is trying to get employees to treat the equipment as if it were their own. Because of their intensive use, the 2011 vehicles being replaced appear to be 20 or 30 years old. Councilors also expressed their pleasure at seeing Parks employees out working early in the morning. Action: On a motion made by Councilor Squailia second by Councilor Zarrella, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #175-23.

Discussion: Commissioner Erickson remained. The chairman read a letter from Mr. Erickson dated June 1, 2023. Councilors asked if the city should have its own fuel tanks. Mr. Erickson said it used to be done, but that the city is still dealing with the aftermath of ground contamination. He also said it is difficult to monitor employees taking fuel for personal use. The current system better tracks fuel purchases. Councilors noted that if work is not getting done, the reason is that there have been vacancies within the department. Councilors asked if they could get regular staffing updates. Mr. Erickson said the situation is getting better and that he could provide staffing updates every couple of months to City Council.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Beauchemin second by Councilor Zarrella, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #176-23.

DPW EXPENSES, POT HOLE REPAIRS

177-23 ORDER: that there be and hereby is appropriated the sum of FOUR THOUSAND, FORTY AND 70/100 DOLLARS (\$4,040.70) same to be charged against RESERVED FOR APPROPRIATION, TNC PER RIDE ASSESSMENT and credited to DPW CAPITAL EXPENSES, STREET REPAIR for the purpose of road repaying.

Discussion: Commissioner Erickson remained. The chairman read a letter from Mr. Erickson dated June 1, 2023. Councilors expressed a preference for using these funds for sidewalk repairs. Mr. Erickson said he does have some flexibility in his budget to do that. City Auditor Calvin Brooks said that City Council could only reduce the recommendation of the mayor; they do not have the authority to add or to change the purpose.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Squailia second by Councilor Zarrella, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #177-23.

ORDER: that the City of Fitchburg hereby approves the expenditure of funds from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Asset Management Grant Program in the approximate amount of \$150,000.00 (ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND AND 00/100 DOLLARS) for the purpose of said grant, which is to begin the development of a GIS based asset management program for stormwater infrastructure.

Discussion: Commissioner Erickson remained. The chairman read a letter from Mr. Erickson dated June 1, 2023. He stated that the grant is through the clean water and drinking water trusts. The department has done a lot of work to inventory stormwater assets and now needs to take steps to put together a management plan for those assets. Councilors asked if the work would be contracted out. Mr. Erickson replied that the in kind service would be city employees, but that the rest of the \$250,000 would be contracted.

Action: On a motion made by Councilor Zarrella second by Councilor Squailia, the committee voted unanimously to approve Order #178-23.

On a motion made by Councilor Zarrella second by Councilor Squailia, the committee voted unanimously to adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 6:50 PM.

Parks Division Account Transfer

The Department of Public Works (DPW) Parks Division respectfully requests approval of the Mayor and City Council to transfer funds within the Parks Division's FY23 budget.

Transfer funds from the following accounts:

- \$85,000 from #016501-510121 Parks P.S. PS Dept. Head: DPW received an appropriation in September 2022 to hire a Superintendent of Parks. After much consideration, it was determined that The Parks and Recreation Divisions would benefit from being restructured, with duties and responsibilities of the Superintendent of Parks being absorbed by the existing positions of Recreation Director and Recreation Assistant. We are currently in the process of restructuring the Parks and Recreation Divisions accordingly, and plan to utilize the funds set aside for the Superintendent of Parks for this purpose in FY24. These same funds are available in the FY23 budget as we did not hire a Superintendent of Parks.
- Transfer \$50,000 from #016501-511115 Parks P.S. Labor: Funds are available due to a vacancy in the Parks Division. We are in the process of filling the vacancy with an internal transfer from the Streets Division, but the funds have remained unspent for the majority of the fiscal year.

Transfer funds to the following accounts:

• \$120,000 to #016508-545426 Parks Equipment - Departmental Equipment:

\$35,000 will be used to purchase an enclosed trailer for equipment. This trailer will allow our parks crews to leave small equipment such as mowers in the trailer at the DPW yard and not require them to be loaded each morning and unloaded each night. We currently do not own an enclosed trailer for parks equipment.

\$85,000 will be used to purchase a 1 ton pickup truck. This truck will replace one of the 2011 Chevy Silverado 1 tons in the parks division. Our current parks one tons have suffered frequent breakdowns and are becoming unsafe to operate. This will allow us to replace one of the two 1 tons in the parks division.

**DPW Account Transfers** 

The Department of Public Works (DPW) respectfully requests approval of the Mayor and City Council for the following account transfers within the DPW budget.

Transfer funds from the following accounts:

- \$40,000 from #014101-511624 DPW Admin/Engineering P.S. Public Works Inspector. Funds are available as the position has been vacant since October 2022 when the DPW Inspector was promoted to Asst. City Engineer.
- \$35,000 from #014101-510411 DPW Admin/Engineering P.S. Asst. City Engineer. Funds are available as the position was vacant for 4 months at the beginning of the fiscal year.
- \$10,000 from #014101-511102 DPW Admin/Engineering P.S. Clerical: Funds are available as the position was vacant for 4 months at the beginning of the fiscal year.
- \$155,000 from #01410741-511115 DPW Streets P.S. Labor: Funds are available due to several vacancies in the Streets Division for various lengths of time during the fiscal year.
- \$30,000 from #01410741-511491 DPW Streets P.S. Summer Help: Funds are available as there were no summer help applicants last summer. The summer help positions are still posted and we are accepting applications. We hope to hire 4 seasonal help for the Streets Division.

Transfer funds to the following accounts:

- Transfer \$170,000 to #014108-545586 DPW Capital Equipment: DPW would like to use the funds to replace two 2011 Chevy Silverado 1 ton pick-up trucks that are in poor condition, suffer frequent mechanical failures, and are becoming a safety concern for the drivers.
- Transfer \$35,000 to #01410744-545447 DPW Expense Gas & Oil: Funds are needed to balance the budget for gas & oil. We accounted for an increase in fuel prices when we wrote our FY23 budget request, however the price of diesel along with the long duration winter snowstorms have caused our actual expense for fuel to exceed our budget.
- Transfer \$35,000 to #01410744-545485 DPW Expense Motor Vehicle Repairs: Funds are needed to balance the budget for motor vehicle repairs. In FY23 we had to perform unexpected, necessary repairs to the grader which cost \$54,000. The grader is

- a key piece of equipment that is used to scrape unpaved roads of snow and ice in winter months and is used as part of the road paving process during construction season.
- Transfer \$30,000 to #01410744-545613 DPW Expense Pothole Repair Supplies: Funds are needed to balance the budget for pothole repair supplies as a result of the rising costs of asphalt as well as the volume of potholes filled during the year. DPW has at least one dedicated pothole crew out every regular shift filling potholes.

Re: Acceptance of MassDEP Asset Management Grant Program Funds

Dear Honorable Mayor DiNatale:

Earlier this year, the City was notified that it was awarded a grant in the amount of \$150,000 through the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) Asset Management Grant Program to begin the development of a Geographic Information System (GIS) based asset management program for its stormwater infrastructure.

The DPW will use the grant funds to continue the asset management efforts in water, wastewater and stormwater. The goals for this project include:

- Improve the current stormwater system mapping in GIS including verifying inventory information, expanding the inventory to include previously undocumented assets, improving GIS feature connectivity, and expanding the depth of information and attributes assigned to assets.
- Perform a desktop condition and risk assessment of the stormwater pipeline system.
- Develop a capital improvement plan for stormwater pipelines to ensure that proper investments are made to repair or replace these assets.
- Prioritize areas for detailed CCTV inspections.

As a result of this project, the City will be able to increase the flexibility of City staff to access stormwater system information via GIS and improve the accuracy and completeness of existing data. The City will also be able to prioritize its stormwater pipeline assets based on asset condition and consequence of failure and improve its ability to make data-driven capital planning decisions regarding how to best allocate limited funds for asset rehabilitation and replacement (R&R).

The DPW has committed to provide both a cash match of \$87,402 and in-kind services valued at \$12,600. I respectfully request that the Mayor and City Council accept the grant in the amount of \$150,000 from MassDEP and allow the expenditure of funds from the grant to complete the Scope of Work identified in the attached Grant Agreement.
